'Just Trading Scotland' are aiming for a milestone of selling 100 tonnes of fairly traded rice and we are doing our bit to help.

Partnering with rice farms in Malawi, 'Just Trading Scotland' encourages congregations and groups to sell 90kg of rice; each 1 kg bag costing £2.90.

This means that farmers get

a fair price for their product and the work that they do. 90kg of rice sold

enables a rice farmer to

pay for a child to go to secondary school for one year, a little bit helps in such a lot of ways.
